
Minsmere - A National Treasure

- One of the UK's premier places to watch wildlife; the "Disneyland of Nature" *Chris Packham*.
- One of the most bio-diverse areas in the country.
- Home to over 5,600 species, more than any other RSPB Reserve.
- Pivotal in the recovery of several species from the brink of UK extinction.
- Host to rare and threatened species including Avocet, Bittern, Marsh Harrier, Nightingale and Bearded Tit.
- Featured on BBC *Springwatch* from 2013 2015, watched by millions.

The Reserve and the surrounding areas are sensitive ecosystems:

- With SSSI, SPA, SAC and Ramsar internationally recognised designations.⁽⁶⁾
- Completely within the Suffolk Coast and Heaths Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.
- Habitats rely on a delicate balance of land, water and vegetation management.
- The Sizewell C site will abut Minsmere and destroy part of the Sizewell Marsh.
- SSSI Habitats are at risk from fragmentation, destruction, air and water pollution, noise, vibration and light pollution.







The Suffolk Coast and the Tourist Economy

- Suffolk tourism is worth over £250 million/year, and is concentrated on the coast within the AONB.
- Minsmere attracts 125,000 people annually, supports over 100 jobs and is worth £3 million/year to the local economy.
- Visitors will stay away because of the noise and disruption; it will take many years to entice them back.
- Income will be lost for over 10-12 years
